Teach—Using Audience and Purpose

- ◆ Ask students to explain what a news story is. a story in a newspaper that gives new information to readers about a person, an event, or a thing Remind them that they are writing a news story about the weather.
- ◆ Review with students the audience they chose and the purpose they set for their writing. **Possible Answer** a story for other students to read so they will know what kind of weather we have observed this week.


Guided Practice

◆ Use your model notes to create a sample draft on the board. Have students suggest which sections of your notes you should include in your weather news story. Tell them to use your draft as a model when they write.

Apply

→ Tell students to use the notes they made in Lessons 6 and 7 to begin writing a news story about the weather. Tell them to keep their audience and purpose in mind as well as their plan from page 193 of **Skills Practice 1.** Encourage
