
Day 3 Reading and Responding

(b) Asking Questions Teacher Modeling: Here are two homes that look very different. One is made of clay. The other is made of ice. Why are these two homes made so differently? Let's read the text to find the answers.

Answering Questions Teacher Prompt: These two homes are very different. The header for the last several pages is Using What Is at Hand. That answers part of our question. These homes are built with things from the area around them. The desert must have lots of clay. There must be lots of ice in the Arctic. What other answers does the text provide? **Possible Student Response** One home is in the desert. The text says the clay keeps a home cool. So this desert must be hot.
