Challenge

CAUSE AND EFFECT Engage advanced learners in a "what if" discussion about the story. For example, what would have happened if the robins hadn't laughed at Toad.

Comprehension Skills



Cause and Effect

Review all of the causes and effects on the board. Guide students to see that stories are made up of a series of causes and effects.

Direct students to pages 40 and 41. Ask why Frog and Toad were so happy. (They finally got the kite to fly.)



Teacher Tip VOCABULARY If, while reading the text, students read an unknown word, have them crosscheck the illustrations and cues in

the text to figure out the meaning.

Research in Action

Decoding and Comprehension

A lack of skill in decoding words directly affects students' higher order comprehension. This is because word recognition and comprehension compete for attention: the more effort readers require to decode a word, the less attention they have left for comprehension. If readers have to struggle with words, they can easily lose track of meaning. *Michael Pressley*
